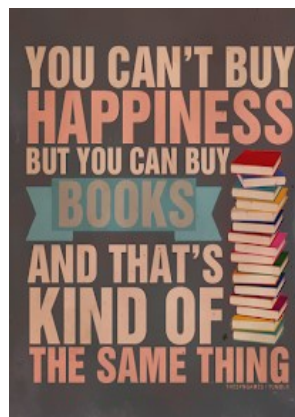
## Annual Used Book Sale

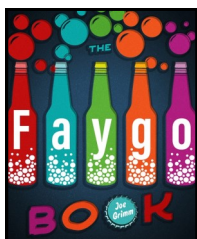
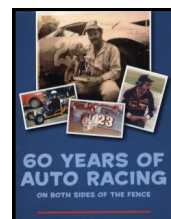

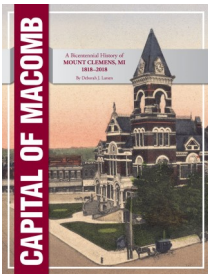

## Sneak Previews - Fall 2018

Here's a look at what's coming from your favorite authors this fall. Registered library card holders may call the library at (586) 469-6200 to place holds on these forthcoming titles. **Albom, Mitch.** *The Next Person You Meet in Heaven.* (October). Sequel to *The Five People You Meet in Heaven*. Eddie has a heavenly reunion with Annie - the little girl he saved on earth- in this unforgettable novel of how our lives and losses intersect.

**Baldacci, David.** *Long Road to Mercy.* (November). Atlee Pine, an FBI agent with special skills assigned to the remote wilds of the western United States, confronts a monster and an old nightmare at the same time.

**Child, Lee.** *Past Tense: A Jack Reacher Novel.* (November). Family secrets come back to haunt Jack Reacher. On a hitchhike trip across America he stops in the New England town where his father was born and intrigue ensues.

**Cook, Robin.** *Pandemic.* (December). A young woman dies on the New York City subway, evidently from a particularly vicious strain of the flu. The autopsy reveals that she'd had a heart transplant with her DNA matching that of the heart, and after two similar cases, Dr. Jack Stapleton finds himself in the midst of a biotech conspiracy.

**Evanovich, Janet.** *Look Alive Twenty-Five: A Stephanie Plum Novel.* (November). This next installment of the Stephanie Plum series takes Stephanie on a mystery to her favorite deli.

**Griffin, W. E. B.** *The Enemy of My Enemy.* (December). Special agent James Cronley Jr. fights ex-Nazis and the Soviet NKGB in the new Clandestine Operations novel about the birth of the CIA and the Cold War.

**King Stephen.** *Elevation.* (October). The story about a man whose mysterious affliction brings a small town together by finding common ground despite deep-rooted differences.

**Koontz, Dean.** *The Forbidden Door: A Jane Hawk Novel.* (September). One of the FBI's top agents, now one of the nation's most wanted fugitives, takes on a powerful secret society with terrifying mind-control technology.

**Moriarty, Liane.** *Nine Perfect Strangers.* (November). Nine people gather at a remote health resort all for different reasons. They know the ten days might involve some real work, but none of the members realize how challenging the ten days will actually be.

**Patterson, James.** *Target: Alex Cross.* (November). A sniper hits D.C. and Alex Cross is asked by the president to lead the investigation. His wife Bree Stone, the newly elevated chief of D.C. detectives, must solve the case or lose her position.

**Rice, Anne.** *Blood Communion: A Tale of Prince Lestat.* (October). Vampire Chronicles continues. Prince Lestat tells the tale of his coming to rule the vampire world and the eternal struggle to find belonging. Against his will, he must battle the menacing, seemingly unstoppable force determined to stop his vision and destroy the entire vampire netherworld.

**Robb, J.D.** *Leverage in Death: An Eve Dallas Novel.* (September). Lieutenant Eve Dallas investigates a suicide bombing at a Wall St. office building in this latest installment in the J.D. Robb series.
